Annual Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors, we are pleased to present the following report, which highlights Little Athletics Queensland's financial position and achievements in the 2019 / 2020 season between the period of April 2019 and March 2020.

Registrations

Registrations for the season 1st April 2019 to 31st March 2020 closed at 11,826 athletes. This is a decrease of 903 athletes from the previous season.

A new Centre was reformed at Chinchilla and they enjoyed a successful first season with 39 registrations.

Our Centre at Yeppoon formally closed after 42 years with our sport. We thank their committee for their ongoing efforts to keep the Centre operating during difficult times.

Centres at Kyogle, Goodna and Forest Lake did not operate this season.

Competitions

The number of athletes competing at Association competitions in the 2019/2020 season decreased overall by 175 from the previous year. The report shows a decrease in participation at all Regional competitions across both the Winter and Summer seasons.

The Summer Carnival in November continues to be a successful and popular event, with an increase in participation of 232 athletes. This increase resulted in a review of the program and events offered.

Unfortunately, the 2020 McDonald's State Championships in March were cancelled due to COVID-19. There were 1,962 athletes nominated to compete at this competition. This is a slight decline of numbers (-23) compared to the 2018 State Championship participation figures when the competition was last held in Brisbane.

In all LAQ competitions Multi Class participation continues to grow.

Officials Seminars and the Australian Athletics Officials Education Scheme

The Australian Athletics Officials Education Scheme (AAOES) and online accreditation data indicates a decrease of LAQ Official activity, however, some of this can be attributed to a review and removal of historical data of inactive Officials. The current number of LAQ Officials is detailed below.

The past season has seen little increase in the number of new accredited officials in the sport. Those already involved continue to advance their qualifications through further education and event experience. There was a total of 58 participants engaged in 3 Metro & 3 Regional workshops and seminars.

With the continued intent of the LAQ Officials Committee and the QA Officials Commission to work together to improve and provide various avenues for members seeking official's education, information, and experience at the local level, the LAQ membership should see increased delivery of education and accreditation opportunities during the coming seasons.

FAST Program

FAST is a fundamental athletics skills training session utilising games and skill development activities to teach the basic, fundamental movement patterns of the events experienced in a Little Athletics competition. FAST is an eight (8) week program of one (1) our each week that teaches these skills and leads up to a modified "competition" at the end of the period.

LAQ uses this program to gauge interest, mainly of the parents, in communities prior to establishing a Little Athletics Centre.

In 2019 FAST programs were run in Samford and Morven with 65 athletes in attendance. Discussions are ongoing with the communities as to if they will formally start a Little Athletics Centre.

State Team



With the introduction of the age group changes nationally, this year's Australian Little Athletics Championships incorporated additional athletes born in October - December who would have missed out on their opportunity for selection due to these changes. The team size was increased to 40 athletes for 2019 only.

The selected team competed at the Australian Little Athletics Championships in Hobart on the 20th and 21st of April. Our U13 Team finished 2nd overall at the competition. Results included:

Gold Medals - 3, Silver Medals - 8 and Bronze Medals - 6. There was also 30 top 8 placings.

Our U15 athletes finished 3rd overall in the Life Members Trophy. Congratulations to Laylani Va'ai who placed 3rd overall in the competition.

LAA National U15 Camp

From the 29th September - 2nd October 2019, 13 LAQ athletes were selected to attend the LAA National U15 Coaching Camp. This camp was held at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra. Athletes were housed, ate and had many opportunities to use and explore the facilities of the AIS. The coaching sessions allowed our representatives the opportunity to work with some of Australia's top coaches and athletes. They also took part in a number of presentations which included Strength & Conditioning, Stretching, Recovery and Injury Prevention / Self Massage.



New Zealand Development Tour



In January 2020 the Association successfully ran its 12th New Zealand Development Tour with 25 athletes attending. Athletes spent 11 days travelling, training and competing together throughout the South Island of New Zealand. They also competed against athletes from all over New Zealand's South Island.

This was the third year that the athletes had the opportunity to compete in two competitions while on tour. The first of these competitions was the Colgate Games in Christchurch. The second (and major tour competition) was the South Island Teams Championships, where our Team finished 1st overall. This is the fifth time since the tours inception that our travelling group has finished 1st overall and claimed the Findlay-Vivian Cup.

Regional Support and Liaison

Members of the Board and Staff travelled to the majority of Regions throughout the State in conjunction with Regional Championships to discuss local issues and to assist with the running of the competitions.

Strategic Plan 2020-2024

The Board participated in strategic planning workshops with prominent Queensland sports consultant Peter Phair. The completed plan was ratified at the July Board meeting. It will be circulated to all Centres and posted on the LAQ website once the formatting is finalised. All members of the Board commented that it was the best strategic planning exercise they had undertaken in their time with LAQ.

Little Athletics Queensland and Queensland Athletics

Regular liaison took place between the respective CEO's and operational staff of both organisations. Of particular focus was the alignment of competition calendars. It was agreed that both organisations will continue to meet before competitions dates are set so that clashes can be avoided for athletes and officials. A dual sanctioned event was conducted at Spring Carnival in Bundaberg.

Annual Conference & AGM

The Annual Conference and AGM took place at Novotel Twin Waters on the Sunshine Coast. At the AGM, Dave Brown and Tony Frampton were re-elected as General Directors. There were no nominations for the position of Finance Director.

Discussion groups and workshops were provided as part of the conference agenda, which included: Finding your Club's Untapped Potential, Results HQ, Nutrition for the Developing Athlete, Marketing, Sponsorship and Events, Innovative Centre Programming, Competitions of the Future, Secrets of Posiatry for the Young Athlete Everyone Must Know and Long Term Athlete Development.

A presentation was also made with a panel of athletes from all levels of our sport. The purpose of the presentation was to get direct feedback from athletes who have been involved in our sport and for them to give our members an idea of what they got out of our sport as athletes. Panel members included Kobe Hinton (Mudgeeraba LAC), Zane Branco (Australian World U20 representative), Cedric Dubler (Olympian) and Dani Stevens (World Champion and Olympian).

Competition and Registration Systems

All Centres are now using SportsTG or ResultsHQ for registrations and nominations with Team Manager phased out of use. The Timing Solutions contract for ResultsHQ was renewed with feedback provided from the Centres on potential improvements. The system's ability to be used increasingly used for regional competitions was negotiated into the agreement.

Corporate Support

The Association's major sponsor, McDonald's, renewed their sponsorship for a further 3 years with an increase in the cash component provided under the agreement. The partnership, this season, will reach 40 years in duration which is one of the longest serving grass roots sponsorships ever in Australian sport. Additional activations are planned for this season to celebrate the milestone.

National sponsor, Coles, again provided bananas and promotional products to the athletes. They also paid for Olympics athletes to visit 4 lucky Centres in Queensland and deliver hands-on clinics through the Coles Little Athlete Big Dreams program. Under the sponsorship, they also provided naming rights to the Spring and Summer Carnivals.

Nordic Sport continued to sponsor the 11 Regional Championships and Comfort Inn & Suites Robertson Gardens are in the middle of a 3 year partnership. Kumon Australia, in January, didn't renew their sponsorship.

LAQ also partnered with Aspirations for 4 Kids to provide assistance to disadvantaged athletes to compete at state level competitions. Five families received \$500 each under the program.

Queensland Government Support

The 3 year State Government SDP funding was extended to all funded sports for an additional 18 months bringing our anticipated funding renewal date to June 2021. This coincided with the release of the Activate Queensland 2019-2029 Strategic Plan. This provided a timely opportunity for LAQ to closer align our strategic priorities with those of the State Government.

Marketing and Promotion

Radio advertising was aired in Brisbane on Hit105, 97.3FM and on the Southern Cross Austereo network in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay and Rockhampton. Digital roadside billboard advertising was commissioned in high traffic areas in Brisbane during the Summer sign-on campaign. LAQ also advertised on Facebook for both the Summer and Winter sign-ons. Regional newspapers were used during both summer and winter campaigns.

Board and Staffing

Ros McAlister served her final term on the LAQ Board bringing to a close 15 years of service at the 2019 Annual General Meeting. The Board thanked Ros for her outstanding contribution to the administration of the sport over an extended period. She was offered the opportunity to assist North Queensland as the Regional Support Officer which she accepted. Gary Morrisby was appointed after the AGM to fill the vacant Finance Director role along with Brad Jones was appointed to fill the vacant General Director role left by Dave Brown after he accepted a paid position with Queensland Athletics. Of the remaining Directors up for election, Tony Frampton was re-elected to the Board at the Annual General Meeting.

There were no changes in staff.

Thank You

2019/2020 Season was another successful one for our sport but unexpectedly brought with it the beginning of an unprecedented challenge with the worldwide spread of COVID-19. Whilst the full effects will not be known until the end of the season and beyond, Little Athletics Queensland is determined to minimise the impact as much as possible and come out the other side of the pandemic well-prepared to grow the sport in all ways possible.

Again, thanks also to the Association Staff: Simon, Shannon, Karen, Shaun, Kendal, Ngaire, Amanda-Jayne, and Bianca who have been very supportive of the Centres and Board.

To the Board, and particularly departing Finance Director, Ros McAlister and General Director, Dave Brown, thank you for your contribution.

The Board of Directors would like to extend their thanks to all Centres and Association Committees, Coaches and Officials for all of their hard work throughout the course of the year.

Audited Financial Accounts

Overview

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I present the following Finance Report, together with the Annual Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The Association recorded an operating deficit of \$5,757, which compares unfavourable with the budgeted net profit of \$1,865, approved for the period of 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020.

I would like to acknowledge the contribution from our Finance Team over the past year, CEO, Simon Cook and Finance Officer, Amanda-Jayne Noble for the preparation of the figures presented in this report.

The accounts have been signed off as a true and correct record by the Association Auditors, Morris & Batzloff.

Income & Expenditure

The total income for the year was \$1,598,049 compared to the budgeted figure of \$1,630,141 which represents an unfavourable variance of \$32,092.

The total expenditure for the year was \$1,603,807 compared to the budgeted figure of \$1,628,275, which represents a favourable variance of \$24,468.

- Decrease in income and expenditure for Coaching Camps (\$18,000) due to Development staff conducting School Holiday Coaching Clinics instead of a camp.
- Increase in income (\$12,787) and expenditure (\$14,363) for NZ Tour with more athletes going on the Tour.

Centre Development

- Increase in expenditure for New Centre Development (\$1,164) with the formation of a new Centre at Chinchilla and the payment of Conference fees for new Centres Ross River and Granite Belt.

Officials Development

- Increase in expenditure for Officials Education (\$2,100) as a result of more face to face workshops being conducted.

Operational

- Decrease in Operational total income (\$80,095) due to drops in Summer and Winter registration income.
- Increase in expenditure for Dual Registrations (\$4,961) as a result of more Winter Centres taking advantage of the program.

Competition

- Decrease in income (\$18,840) and expenditure (\$23,407) for the cancellation of the State Championships due to COVID-19.
- Increase in income (\$5,391) and expenditure (\$4,660) for the Summer Carnival due to an increase in the amount of athletes competing.
- Increase in expenditure for General Expenses (\$3,448) due to changing of medals for the Combined Events Championships (previously Junior & Senior Pentathlon) and Winter Carnival (previously Winter Championships).

Marketing

- Increase in income for Sponsorship (\$18,188) with the signing of a new deal with McDonald's.

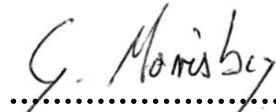

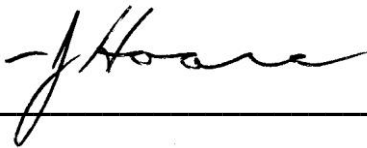
As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

Notes to and forming part of the accounts for the 12 months ended 31 March 2020

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981. The directors have determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

a. Income Tax

Queensland Little Athletics Association is an exempt body under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b. Non-Current Assets

Property, plant and equipment have been brought to account at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

The depreciable amounts of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

c. Accounting Period

These financial statements are for the period 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020.

d. New and Amended Accounting Policies**AASB 16 - Leases**

The association has not adopted AASB 16 in relation to the lease of its premises. AASB 16 recognises a right of use asset and corresponding lease liability in the statement of financial position. The association's commitments under its premise's lease are outlined in Note 2 to these financial statements. Monthly lease payments are included in expenses in the association's profit & loss statement.

e. Comparative Figures

Comparative figures, where appropriate have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation in the current financial year or as a result of any application of new accounting standards.

f. Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries and annual leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Contributions are made by the association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

g. Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

h. Revenue Recognition

All revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the association and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is stated net of the amount of GST.

Interest revenue is recognised on receipt.

Grant revenue is recognised when the association gains control over the funds which is generally at the time of receipt and in accordance with specific performance obligations included in relevant contracts.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to recipients.

i. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other short term highly liquid investments with banks

j. Account Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from customers and members and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets.

k. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

l. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

m. Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period which remain unpaid.

n. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Key Estimates

(i) Impairment

The association assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions and events specific to the association that may be indicative of impairment triggers.

o. Economic Dependence

Queensland Little Athletics Association receives substantial support from the Queensland Government via grants used to assist in its operations. At the date of this report the directors have no reason to believe the Queensland Government will not continue that support.

2. FUTURE COMMITMENTS

Premises Lease

Following the sale of the association's premises at Yeronga in February 2016 the association leased office space from Stadiums Queensland at QSAC, Kessels Road, Nathan, Queensland. Lease premiums plus outgoings are \$3,299 per month plus GST. The lease expires on the 16 November 2021.

3. MORTGAGES, CHARGES

There are no mortgages or charges over any property of the association.

4. CAPITAL EXPENDITURE COMMITMENTS

There were no significant commitments for capital expenditure at 31 March 2020.

5. EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

COVID-19 Pandemic

The impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the restrictions imposed in the management of the pandemic and the depressed economic environment have considerably impacted the operations of the association with its main focus being shifted from the normal day to day operations to providing support and advice to its members and associates during the lockdown period. Looking forward the association is planning for the resumption of little athletics activities, reviewing the competition calendar for the remainder of the year and readying itself to commence advocating with Government for financial support of the sport as the country emerges from the crisis.

6. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

A public liability claim has been lodged with the association and is being dealt with by the association's insurer.
