This figure compares favourably with the budgeted net profit of \$7,409 approved for the period 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021. The Finance Director provided an explanation of the significant variances. The accounts have been signed off as a true and correct record by the Association Auditors, Morris & Batzloff.

This has been amended to Tablelands LAC and the registration figures have been changed to reflect the correct numbers.

Annual Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors, we are pleased to present the following report, which highlights Little Athletics Queensland's financial position and achievements in the 2021 / 2022 season between the period of April 2021 and March 2022.

COVID & Flood Recovery

COVID had a reduced effect on all levels of the Association with the gradual lifting of restrictions throughout the season. Mandatory checking in to facilities and compulsory COVID Plans still had to be managed, however, for all Centre, Regional and State competitions and we were praised by the State Government on how well we handled this new normal. Thankfully, no competitions had to be cancelled due to lockdowns.

Just when the sport was returning to normal, mother nature reminded us who's in charge when devastating floods ravaged through South East Queensland in late February. Unprecedented rain fell on the river catchments which resulted in flash flooding both in Queensland and over the NSW border. Harrowing photos and videos showed the full effects with some Centres going under by 6 metres. The recovery process is still ongoing with complications in the national insurance program and further poor weather still occurring in the catchments.

The LAQ Board extends its sympathies to Centres affected by the floods and thanks all Centres for how well you managed the COVID recovery.

Registrations

Registrations for the season 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2022 closed at 13,237 athletes. This is an increase of 3,195 athletes from the previous season.

We welcomed back Centres at Dirranbandi and Texas this season, both recording excellent registration figures from their small communities. Centres at Mitchell, Wulguru, Border Blues and Mt Tarampa did not operate this season due to difficulties in filling committee positions.

Competitions

The number of athletes competing at Association competitions in the 2021/2022 season increased overall by 1,117, excluding the participation numbers (248) of the Winter Carnival that was cancelled the previous year. The report shows a significant increase in participation at the Summer Carnival, and a return to pre-COVID numbers for the Summer Regional competitions, with little changes to the Winter Region figures.

With the Coles Summer Carnival in November continuing to be a successful and popular event and an increase in participation of 326 athletes, further review of the program and events offered are being undertaken.

The McDonald's State Championships was successfully held in March, experiencing increases in the U16 and U17 participation across most events. Multi Class athlete participation continues to also grow in this event.

Officials Seminars and the Australian Athletics Officials Education Scheme

The current number of accredited LAQ Officials remains very difficult to calculate as LAQ does not have direct access to the Australian Athletics Officials Education Scheme (AAOES) database. LAQ staff are in the process of creating an LAQ database by collating reports from the AAOES coordinator and removing non-active officials. Members using the online learning scheme appear to be to similar levels to previous seasons.

There was a total of 109 participants engaged in five metropolitan and 3 regional workshops.

The LAQ Officials Committee continues to work towards improving the back to basic education opportunities at grassroots level using both face-to-face and online methods. The LAQ membership should see increased delivery of education and accreditation opportunities for all levels during the coming seasons.

School Programs (including Little Athletics Program for Schools (LAPS))

FAST Program

FAST is a fundamental athletics skills training session utilising games and skill development activities to teach the basic, fundamental movement patterns of the events experienced in a Little Athletics competition. FAST is an eight (8) week program of one (1) hour each week that teaches these skills and leads up to a modified "competition" at the end of the period.

LAQ uses this program to gauge interest, mainly of the parents, in communities prior to establishing a Little Athletics Centre.

In 2021 a FAST program was run in Bollon and Collinsville with 52 athletes in attendance.

State Team

The 2021 Coles Australian Little Athletics Championships were cancelled due to COVID. Instead, a virtual event was conducted by Little Athletics Australia, which recognised athletes nationally based on their performance at each State Championships. LAQ selected a team of 45 athletes for 2021 and 38 for 2020 to recognise their achievements.

LAA National U15 Camp

13 athletes were selected to take part in the 2021 Coles Little Athletics Australia National U15 Camp at the AIS in Canberra. Unfortunately, the Camp was postponed until January 2022 to be held on the Gold Coast. Unfortunately, the rescheduled camp was cancelled due to COVID.

New Zealand Development Tour

A Team of 43 athletes were selected to take part in the annual Tour In January 2022. Unfortunately the Tour was cancelled due to the Trans-Tasman borders not being open due to COVID. Instead, a 5-day development camp was held for these athletes at the Gold Coast Performance Centre in January 2022. A total of 28 athletes attended this Camp.

Regional Support and Liaison

Members of the Board and Staff travelled to the majority of Regions throughout the State in conjunction with Regional Championships to discuss local issues and to assist with the running of the competitions.

Strategic Plan 2020-2024

Reports against LAQ's KPI's were presented at the September Board Meeting. Although the COVID recovery, and putting some activities on hold until after the One Athletics vote was held, affected the majority of areas, most KPI's were still able to be achieved.

Little Athletics Queensland and Queensland Athletics

Regular liaison took place between the respective CEO's and operational staff of both organisations. Of particular focus remains the alignment of competition calendars. To assist with this, LAQ moved its Summer Carnival and State Championships to facilitate the holding of Queensland athletics All Schools and Athletics Australia National Championships. Athletics Australia does need to set its calendar a lot sooner to prevent changes having to be made at other levels of the sport.

A dual sanctioned competition was conducted at the Spring Carnival in Bundaberg.

Annual Conference & AGM

The Annual Conference and AGM took place at the Hilton Hotel Surfers Paradise. At the AGM, Gary Morrisby was re-elected as Finance Director and Tony Frampton and Brad Jones were re-elected as General Directors.

Discussion groups and workshops were provided as part of the conference agenda, which included: The Things You Need to Know About Governance, Beginner and Advanced Use of Results HQ, One Athletics, How to be a High Performing Centre Committee, Creating an Effective Centre Coaching Program, Excellence in Centre Administration, Heel Pain in the Emerging Athlete and Using Technology in Athletics.

Association Awards

Volunteer of the Year Award was presented to Mark Chester (Townsville Central).

Alison Quirke Official of the Year was presented to Tony Frampton (Balmoral).

Officials Merit Award was presented to Gary Barton (Gympie).

George Harvey Award was presented to Eboniee Hilton (Caboolture) and Caden Wyatt (Bargara & District).

Laurie Baartz Memorial Trophy was awarded to Liliana Brillante (Bargara & District).

Corporate Support

The Association's major sponsor, McDonald's, celebrated 42 years with LAQ extending its partnership further as one of the longest serving and most successful grass roots sponsorships ever in Australian sport. Championship events, Age Labels, Registration Patches, Achievement Awards and sign-on bags and vouchers were all provided under the sponsorship and an innovative #HowToLittleAthletics campaign was conducted to teach the skills of running Centres through Youtube videos. The Association thanks McDonald's for their outstanding support over this extended period.

Nordic Sport continued its support of LAQ through naming rights of the Regional Championships and Regional Relays. This brings the partnership to almost 20 successful years. Thank you to Neal Pitman and the team at Nordic Sport for your generous support of Little Athletics Queensland.

National sponsor, Coles, provided naming rights to all LAQ Carnivals along with bananas and promotional products to the athletes. They also hosted a Coles Community Round and Athlete of the Month Awards.

Comfort Inn & Suites Robertson Gardens continued their long standing partnership with Little Athletics Queensland celebrating 21 proud years during the season.

Queensland Government Support

Little Athletics Queensland was notified of a 12 month extension to its State Government SDP funding program which will take it through to July 2023. The Department was instrumental in leading all Queensland sports through the COVID and Flood recovery processes providing guidance and funding support to grass roots sports.

Little Athletics Queensland was also successful in receiving additional funding of \$55,000 under the Active Industry Project Fund to build an online learning portal for our Centres and members. This will be completed in late 2022.

Marketing and Promotion

Radio advertising was aired in Brisbane on B105, 97.3FM and on the Southern Cross Austereo network in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay and Rockhampton. Digital roadside billboard advertising was commissioned in high traffic areas in Brisbane during the Summer sign-on campaign on GOA billboards. LAQ also increased its advertised on Facebook for both the Summer and Winter sign-ons in lieu of print advertising which is no longer feasible. Additional promotions were also conducted before the start of the season to capitalise on the 2021 Tokyo Olympics.

Board and Staffing

Gary Morrisby was re-elected as Finance Director at the AGM. Of the remaining Directors up for election, Tony Frampton and Brad Jones were re-elected to the Board at the Annual General Meeting.

There were no changes in staff. Shannon Kruger was recognised for her 20 years of employment with LAQ in January 2022.

Vale

On 26th March 2022, LAQ lost a valued and respected servant of our sport, with the passing of Life Member, Barrie Cox. Barrie's contribution as a technical official and volunteer to the growth and development of Little Athletics spanned over four decades. Barrie immersed himself in all levels of our sport from grass roots to State, National and International level. His happy, helpful and humble nature will be missed by many. He was a true gentleman, a genuinely nice man, who always treated others with respect, kindness and humility. He was a wonderful friend to us all and will be greatly missed.

Thank You

2021/2022 Season unexpectedly brought with it the continued challenge of COVID and the South East Queensland Floods. Whilst the interruptions significantly impacted our sport, the Little Athletics community showed its fighting spirit by rising above it and continued to provide sporting opportunities for the children of Queensland. Full credit must be given to all Centres and Regional Committees for working through this tough period once again.

Audited Financial Accounts

Overview

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I present the following Finance Report, together with the Annual Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2022.

The total income for the year was \$1.418m which is higher than budget by \$36,701 and total expenditure was \$1.387m which is \$98,776 less than budget resulting in an operating profit of \$31,686 which is higher than forecast by \$135,477.

Analysis of Detailed Profit and Loss Statement

Significant variances in Income and Expenditure are explained as follows:

Administration

- Additional income from Sale of Asset - trade in of two vehicles (\$24,048)
- Income from interest was less than expected due to interest rates remaining low
- Lower than expected expenditure with savings across most areas (\$14,677) as a result of more efficient work practices and continuation of some out of office work
- Overall saving in Administration of \$32,690

Conference

- Income and expenditure less than budget due to the limit on numbers allowed at the Conference
- Net result was a saving of \$5,331

Development

- The NZ tour was cancelled but an event was held for the athletes at the Gold Coast Performance Centre resulting in the income and expenditure variance for the event
- There was no ALAC competition in 2021 so there was no significant income or expenses. We received \$10,000 from LAA as a contribution towards a function for the team.
- Schools Programs had a decrease in income (\$22,528) and expenditure (\$16,844) with continuing constraints on development staff not being allowed on school grounds

Operational

- Summer registrations were above expectation by about 12% and Winter registrations were down by about the same. Result was an increase in registration revenue of \$76,176.
- The higher registration numbers resulted in an Operational saving of \$80,035

Competition

- Income was generally on budget for our main events. Increase in income for Summer and Spring Carnival and Regional Relays with more than expected nominations
- Expenditure for Summer Carnival was lower than budget. Forecast had included possibility of late finish which did not occur
- Expenditure for State Championships higher than budget (\$6,008) due to increase in venue hire and catering/services
- Overall result for Competition was net saving of \$14,316

Marketing

- Additional expenditure for advertising was aligned to marketing during the Tokyo Olympics

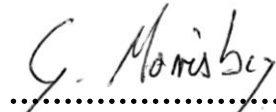

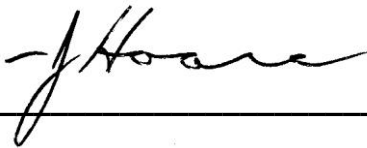
As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

Notes to and forming part of the accounts for the 12 months ended 31 March 2022

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981. The directors have determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

a. Income Tax

Queensland Little Athletics Association is an exempt body under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b. Non-Current Assets

Property, plant and equipment have been brought to account at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

The depreciable amounts of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

c. Accounting Period

These financial statements are for the period 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022.

d. New and Amended Accounting Policies

AASB 16 - Leases

The association has not adopted AASB 16 in relation to the lease of its premises. AASB 16 recognises a right of use asset and corresponding lease liability in the statement of financial

position. The association's commitments under its premise's lease are outlined in Note 2 to these financial statements. Monthly lease payments are included in expenses in the association's profit & loss statement. The association's premises lease is due for renewal on 16 November 2024.

e. Comparative Figures

Comparative figures, where appropriate have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation in the current financial year or as a result of any application of new accounting standards.

f. Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries and annual leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Contributions are made by the association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

g. Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

h. Revenue Recognition

All revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the association and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is stated net of the amount of GST.

Interest revenue is recognised on receipt.

Grant revenue is recognised when the association gains control over the funds which is generally at the time of receipt and in accordance with specific performance obligations included in relevant contracts.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to recipients.

i. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other short term highly liquid investments with banks.

j. Account Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from customers and members and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets.

k. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

l. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

m. Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period which remain unpaid.

n. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Key Estimates

- (i) *Impairment*
The association assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions and events specific to the association that may be indicative of impairment triggers.
- (ii) *Plant and Equipment*
The association reviews the useful life of plant and equipment on an annual basis.

Key Judgements

- (i) *Performance Obligations in relation to Revenue*
To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. The directors exercise judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the relevant arrangements and contracts.

o. Economic Dependence

Queensland Little Athletics Association receives substantial support from the Queensland Government via grants used to assist in its operations. At the date of this report the directors have no reason to believe the Queensland Government will not continue that support.

2. FUTURE COMMITMENTS

Premises Lease

Following the sale of the association's premises at Yeronga in February 2016 the association leased office space from Stadiums Queensland at QSAC, Kessels Road, Nathan, Queensland. Lease premiums plus outgoings are \$3,382 per month plus GST. The lease expires on the 16 November 2024 and there is an option at that time for a further 3 years to the 16 November 2027.

3. MORTGAGES, CHARGES

There are no mortgages or charges over any property of the association.

4. CAPITAL EXPENDITURE COMMITMENTS

There were no significant commitments for capital expenditure at 31 March 2022.

5. EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

The Directors are not aware of any significant event since the end of the reporting period.

6. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

As at 31 March 2022 the directors are not aware of the existence of any contingent liability which may financially impact the association in future financial years.
